Delta Chi Loses Two Long-Time Members

Delta Chi is mourning the loss of a charter member and a 50-year member within two short weeks. Dr. Essie Hayes, who joined DKG in 1970, passed away November 22. Etta Idol, a charter member who joined in 1961, passed away December 7. Delta Chi will honor both ladies in a Ceremony of Remembrance at our March 2021 meeting.

Dr. Essie Hayes was honored in absentia at our September 2020 Delta Chi meeting for her 50-year membership in DKG. Before health issues kept her from attending meetings, Essie came regularly and was a big supporter of chapter projects and activities. Essie faithfully served on committees, including Finance and Research, and

served as hostess for numerous meetings throughout her membership.

Essie taught in the Wilkes County Schools before joining the faculty of Wilkes Community College. She was an educator for over 40 years and later served on the Wilkes County Board of Education where she wholeheartedly led the successful 1990s campaign for Wilkes County's middle schools.

Dr. Essie Hayes was three weeks past her 93rd birthday when she passed away.


Etta retained her active membership status even after she moved to Pfafftown, attending meetings last year with the help of her daughter Sharon. She

She taught high school science for 35 years and inspired many of her students to become science teachers as well.
