# **Member News**

Tina Johnson: Back in July of 2022, I retired from Wilkes County Schools. I treasured my time serving our students and families of our beautiful county and looked favorably on the next chapter of enjoying watching Trey and Savannah excel in all things high school. They are such a blessing in my life. Then on August 29, 2022, life as I had imagined for my retirement changed. I was diagnosed with an Immune-Mediated Necrotizing Myopathy (Polymyositis). This rare muscle disease is treatable (which is a blessing), but has no cure at this time. Unfortunately, this disease has impeded my mobility, and I require assistance from my husband, Bob to get around. (He is a saint!) Sadly, this makes it impossible to attend Delta Chi meetings in person. (I miss you all and know you are doing incredible work!)

I started displaying symptoms of IMNM while working last year. I fell multiple times at school more than my natural clumsiness. (Actually, funny stories involving precious students that I would be happy to share anytime.) Putting off going to the doctor (no high school administrator has time for that) until I was unable to get up from a chair on my own, raise my arms to brush my hair, and suffered the embarrassment of getting stuck on the toilet in the restroom multiple times, (The literal interpretation of getting caught with your pants down. Only luckily I had on a dress on each time to keep some sense of modesty.) that I finally decided get to the doctor. My issues were not normal aging or due to lack of self-care and exercise. Multiple MRIs, CT scans, X-rays, ultrasounds, and a muscle biopsy later, my neurologist made a diagnosis. I am grateful for my neurologist and my family practitioner that have provided me with the best possible care. Currently my treatment plan is taking a high dose of Prednisone daily, and I just started in home IVIG infusion. My short term goal is to be able to wrap Christmas presents for my family without assistance. See the hardest part for me has been the humbling experience of relying on others for help and asking for it. If this disease was meant to teach me a life lesson, then it has. Take time to notice the small things because when the small things are gone, they can leave the biggest hole because these small things really mattered the most!

Sandra Burchette: I retired from Wilkes County Schools with 30.2 years as principal of East Wilkes Middle School July 1. I am currently enjoying being mom to Nathaniel who is a senior at East Wilkes High School and being able to attend all of his high school extracurricular activities. #### NC DKG Educational Law and Policy Committee Stay Informed...

In the news, as the new legislators started the session, an alarm was sounded that enrollment for Educator Preparation Programs had dropped 40%. Enrollment in Residency programs has also declined. This means that by 2024-25, there will not be enough newly licensed teachers to replace those expected to retire. Meanwhile, State Superintendent Truitt is proposing a new plan, Operation Polaris 2.0, to revise supports for low-performing districts.
